Impact Report

In 2022, Blueprint donors invested more than \$3.6M in 125+ competitive Democratic candidates and 30+ civic organizations working to win races and protect our democracy. This critical funding directly contributed to an historic midterm election with the best results in a generation for the party of the sitting president. From flipping state legislatures and blocking GOP trifecta to preventing the anticipated Republican landslide in the U.S. House of Representatives and expanding the Democratic majority in the U.S. Senate, your contributions were critical to winning the closest races.

The near-term support you offered to each Blueprint-supported candidate and organization is equally vital for making long-term progress on protecting voting rights, securing the integrity of our elections, protecting the right to access a safe and legal abortion, taking meaningful action against climate change, strengthening our economy, and more.

Blueprint donors also invested more than \$80,000 in Swing Left's programming in 2022, helping fund the team, research and analysis, and technological infrastructure that make Blueprint's regularly-updated portfolio of candidates and organizations possible. This funding helps our team improve the Blueprint giving experience, develop new features, and conduct deeper political analysis, all while keeping the platform free to our community.

Starting the clock

Focused on early investment in must-win races, voter registration and engagement, and litigation to prevent GOP gerrymandering.

Q2

Heading into primary season

Determined the official Democratic nominees in key state and federal races following the early primary season. Continued fundraising for priority candidates, voter registration efforts, and voter engagement in states including Georgia, New York, Ohio, and Pennsylvania, where the margins were razor-thin.

Q3

Making it count

Updated Blueprint to target the most competitive state and federal races most in need of funding, and continued to support civic organizations conducting voter engagement programs in key states.

4.1 Helped reduce funding gaps for key target races and organizations supporting voter turnout efforts in the days leading up to the election. **4.2** Supported efforts in the Georgia runoff elections.

Democrats expanded their U.S. Senate majority

Historically, the party in power faces significant headwinds during midterm elections. In 2022, Democrats were able to successfully circumvent this trend. **Instead of a purported “red wave,” Senate Democrats expanded their majority from 50 to 51 seats with all incumbent Democrats winning their races and John Fetterman flipping a must-win seat in Pennsylvania.**

An expanded majority in the Senate means Democrats now hold majorities on committees, can more efficiently confirm President Biden’s judicial nominees, can continue to push for meaningful legislation, and are no longer as reliant on Vice President Harris’s tie-breaking vote.

While some of Democrats’ midterms success can be attributed to the GOP’s slate of unqualified extremist candidates at all levels of the ballot, early organizing and early fundraising—including critical support from Blueprint donors as early as 2021—made a real impact, notably in the majority of Blueprint target races that were determined by a margin of less than 10 points.

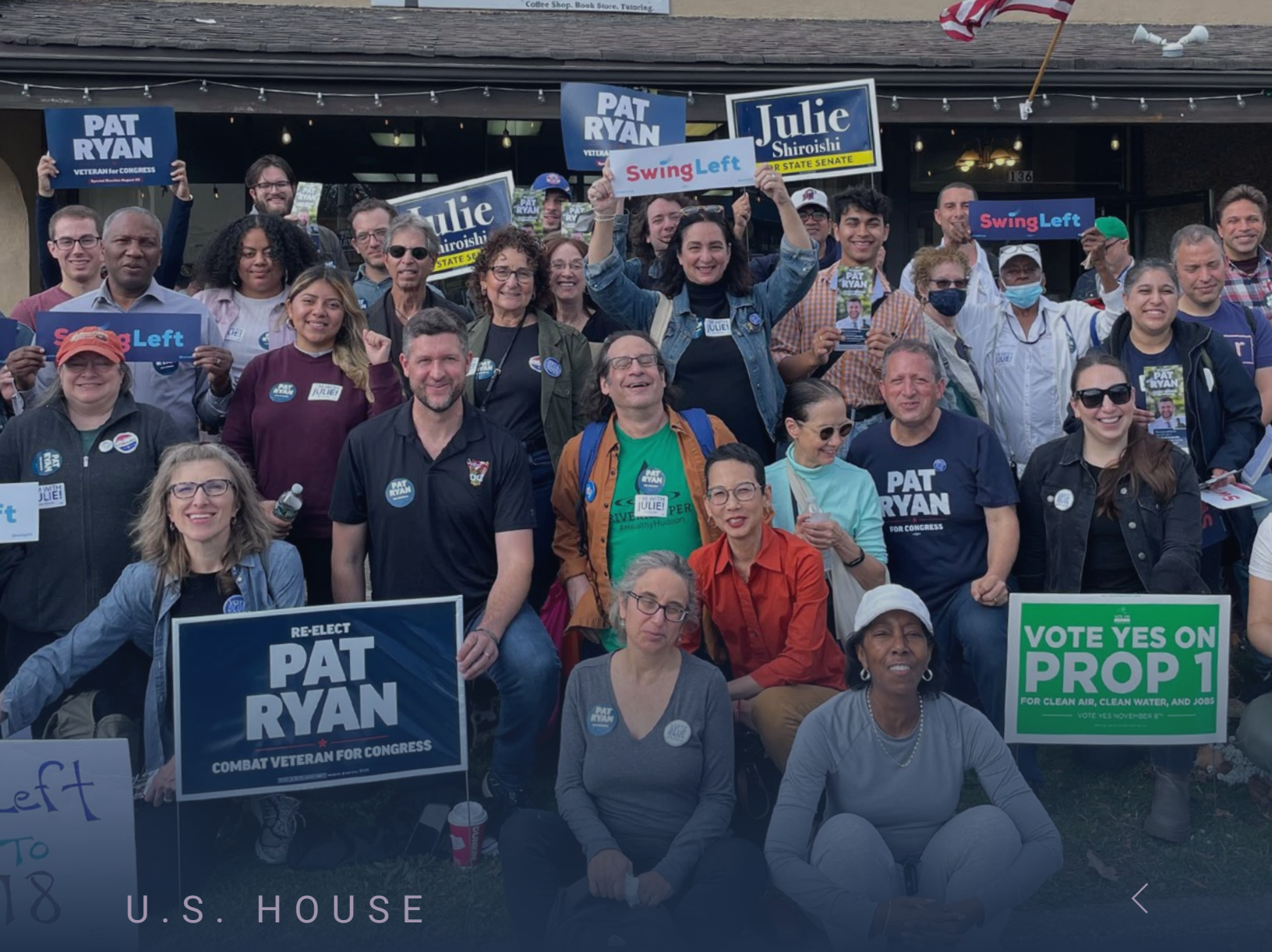


The reelection of incumbent Senators **Mark Kelly** of Arizona, **Raphael Warnock** of Georgia, **Catherine Cortez Masto** of Nevada, and **Maggie Hassan** in New Hampshire allowed Democrats to hold the Senate majority. Kelly was reelected by a margin of 4.9%, while Sen. Cortez Masto notably won by a margin of just 1%, or roughly 9,000 votes. Early funding for Sen. Kelly and Sen. Warnock were included in Blueprint's 2021 Q3 portfolio, and Sen. Cortez Masto's campaign was included in Blueprint's 2021 Q4 recommendations. This early funding helps candidates strategize, staff, and scale their campaigns earlier to compete with well-funded GOP campaigns. As election margins continue to narrow, earlier fundraising and organizing will continue to be paramount.

Mandela Barnes secured the Democratic nomination with a shorter runway leading to Election Day following Wisconsin's late-in-the-cycle primary. Barnes' narrow loss to incumbent Ron Johnson is an important reminder of the continued need to support democratic infrastructure in battleground states year-round, including in odd years. That's why funding for on-the-ground civic organizations remains an ongoing, year-round Blueprint priority. Wisconsin is a perfect example: the state's April 2023 Supreme Court race is an opportunity to deepen investments in community-based organizing, particularly among under-resourced constituencies, while impacting a pivotal election that will define democracy in 2024 and beyond.

Democrats minimized their losses in the U.S. House

While Republicans were able to win a slim 222-213 majority in the House, Democrats minimized their losses and, thanks in part to your critical support via Blueprint, were able to successfully flip congressional districts including **CO-08, IL-13, MI-03, NC-13, NM-02, OH-01, OH-13, OR-06, and TX-34.**

In all, Blueprint donors supported more than 55 candidates for the U.S. House, with 30 seats held and nine seats flipped

2022 U.S. House candidate spotlights



Vicente Gonzalez | TX-34

Rep. Gonzalez formerly served as the representative for Texas's 15th congressional district from 2017 until he was sworn in as representative of TX-34. He voted for the Bipartisan Safer Communities Act and the Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill. He defeated Rep. Mayra Flores, a Trump zealot and QAnon conspiracy theorist and 2020 election denier by a margin of 8.5% —an important win for democracy and a rejection of Republican extremism by voters in this district.



Mary Peltola | AK-AL

In August, Mary Peltola defeated Trump-endorsed former VP nominee Sarah Palin in the August special election to fill Alaska's only U.S. House seat—flipping the seat and making her the first Democrat elected to the House from Alaska since 1970. Peltola is also the first Alaska Native to serve in Congress. Rep. Peltola then won a full term in the House when she defeated Palin again in the November midterms by a margin of 10%.



Emilia Sykes | OH-13

Emilia served as the State Representative for Ohio HD-34 for eight years, including three years as the Ohio House Minority Leader. In 2022, Sykes became the first Black person elected to represent OH-13, defeating former Trump advisor Madison Gesiotto Gilbert by a margin of 5%.



Yadira Caraveo | CO-08

Dr. Yadira Caraveo is committed to protecting reproductive health care and abortion access. Her opponent, state senator Barbara Kirkmeyer, sought to ban abortion access and certain forms of contraception. Rep. Caraveo defeated her extremist GOP opponent by a margin of 0.7%.



Gabe Vasquez | NM-02

Rep. Vasquez is an advocate for policies that benefit working families, including lower cost of health care and child care. He's also committed to protecting New Mexico's public lands and to combating the effects of climate change. His opponent, incumbent Rep. Yvette Herrell, voted against certifying the 2020 election results. Rep. Vasquez defeated Rep. Herrell by a margin of 0.6%.



Hillary Scholten | MI-03

Rep. Scholten is committed to passing legislation to protect and expand the right to vote and to make healthcare more affordable. She defeated pro-Trump radical Republican and conspiracy theorist John Gibbs by a margin of 12.9%.



Andrea Salinas | OR-06

Rep. Salinas is a champion of abortion access, including introducing and passing protections for abortion access as an Oregon state representative. She is committed to policies that will advance gun safety, environmental conservation, and voting rights. Rep. Salinas defeated her Trump loyalist GOP opponent Mike Erickson by a margin of 2%.

Democrats gained power at the state level

Democrats retained key governorships in **Michigan**, **Pennsylvania**, and **Wisconsin**, flipped the governorship in **Arizona**, and made important gains in state legislatures. For Blueprint, that included 37 seats won out of 53 targeted legislative districts, plus 21 seats gained in the New Hampshire legislature, which received contributions at the county level.

Supporting civic organizations

In addition to candidate fundraising, your Blueprint contributions in 2022 focused on maximizing the number of eligible voters participating in our democracy and strengthening the infrastructure necessary to keep voters energized year-round. Investing in 501(c)(3) and 501(c)(4) civic organizations that run programs all year, regardless of the political cycle, is essential for this effort.

In 2022, early investment was key to making sure that organizations in the most competitive states had the necessary support to run ambitious voter engagement, registration, and turnout programs while deepening their organizing networks and long-term infrastructure.

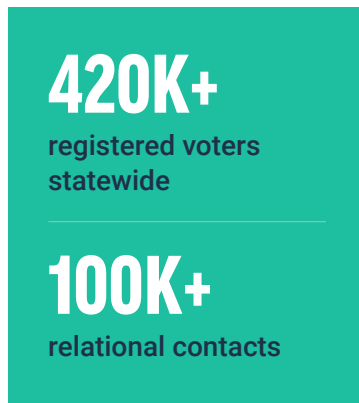

GIVING CIRCLES



Blueprint Giving Circles allow donors to maximize their impact by working with their network to make collective contributions to candidates and civic organizations aligning with their goals. **This year, Giving Circles raised more than \$1 million to support candidates and organizations** working to strengthen democracy—nearly a third of Blueprint’s total contributions for the year.

The Long Game

Early in 2022, The Long Game focused its efforts on fundraising for civic organizations, raising nearly \$50,000 to help strengthen democracy. As the midterms got closer, the group adjusted its focus and raised more than \$16,000 for state legislative candidates running in high-priority races in AZ, MI, and PA before turning to the GA runoff election.

This is Not a Drill

With its first member contribution in September, This is Not a Drill raised more than \$22,000 in a relatively short period of time. The giving circle launched with a focus on women and BIPOC candidates, including in the GA runoff.

Crimson Goes Blue

Blueprint’s largest giving circle, Crimson Goes Blue, raised more than \$500,000 for underfunded Democrats running in key races in 2022. Doubling in size this year, this giving circle now includes 1,600 Harvard alumni from more than 40 graduating classes.

Dollars for Democracy

Dollars for Democracy raised more than \$130,000 for U.S. Senate and gubernatorial candidates in NC, NV, AZ, MI, WI, GA, PA, and OH, in addition to two Blueprint-recommended civic organizations in each state.

Looking ahead

Though the midterms were a resounding rejection of Trump and extremist MAGA candidates, threats to our democracy remain. Many 2020 election deniers and insurrectionists are still in Congress and must be held accountable at the ballot box in 2024 and beyond to protect our democracy and the integrity of future elections.

In 2023, Blueprint will focus investments in state-level campaigns in battleground states with an eye toward retaining control of the White House and Senate, and winning back the U.S. House in 2024.

Our impact is only possible because of this community's tremendous support and commitment to this work. Thank you for continuing to play a pivotal role in powering pro-democracy civic organizations and candidates and chipping away at GOP power at every level of the ballot.
