Impact Report

2021 was a critical year to engage potential voters, protect voting rights, and plan ahead for the midterm elections. As Republican officials continued to attack the right to vote and redistricting was delayed in a number of states, we made quarterly recommendations for civic organizations working to build voter power and fight gerrymandering. In Virginia, knowing how competitive those elections would be, we prioritized the gubernatorial and House of Delegates races that would decide the balance of power in the state. Additionally, we recommended early support for campaigns and organizations that are paving the way for victory in November 2022.

Q1

Starting in the states

Laid the groundwork in the effort to support Democratic control in Virginia, engage voters, and combat partisan gerrymandering.

Q2

Building momentum in the states

Supported Democratic candidates in Virginia as well as civic organizations engaging voters in Virginia and three other states where competitive races will take place this November.

Q3

Getting ahead of the midterms

Expanded on Virginia by investing in additional state and federal campaigns and civic organizations to bolster their preparations for the upcoming elections.

Q4

Setting the pace

4.1 Made a final push in Virginia while fueling civic organizations in key states and zeroing in on must-win state and federal races across the country. **4.2** Doubled down support for on-the-ground efforts to engage voters in battleground states while building up funds for Democrats in competitive 2022 races.

Slim Democratic majorities at the federal level and in key battleground states prompted our team to recommend organizations and candidates that are working to protect and strengthen those levers of power.

Laying the groundwork now, with the goal of building more durable and sustainable political power, means building a community that proactively funds the necessary political work withstanding the ebbs and flows of any given electoral cycle.

This strategy led us to recommend 17 candidates in five swing states: the eventual Democratic nominees in competitive U.S. House and Senate races, Wisconsin's gubernatorial race, and state legislative races in Texas and North Carolina. We focused on races which would determine the balance of power in states with a history of voter suppression and gerrymandering. In Virginia's 2021 elections, Blueprint donors helped three of those candidates win their races and return to Richmond.

For civic organizations, we recommended grassroots groups that are working to build deeper, more sustainable civic infrastructure in the states that goes beyond a presidential election. Early support for these state-based organizations allows them to scale nimble, effective programs year-round, including during midterm years when engagement is lower. Further, registering and re-registering voters after a presidential election can take up to two years, to address people moving or being purged from the voter rolls. These organizations had started that re-registration work in key battleground states and are well positioned to continue their efforts.

Fighting for democracy

There has been a sustained campaign by state lawmakers in Republican-controlled swing states to undermine democracy by passing anti-voting measures. The organizations that Blueprint donors invested in in 2021—from national organizations like All On The Line to community-based programming led by Arizona Wins—were part of efforts to stop these harmful policies and legislation.

These organizations are advocating against such measures in state legislatures, working to appoint thoughtful individuals to independent redistricting commissions, organizing a critical mass of people to engage in the redistricting process, and much more. Alongside these efforts, Blueprint donors also helped fund legal challenges to fight back against unfair maps and anti-voter policies.

Virginia

The 2021 elections in Virginia were always going to be tough. Historically, the Virginia electorate tends to reject the party that holds the White House. Since 1977, the commonwealth has only elected one governor of the incumbent president's party. However, with 48 seats in the House of Delegates and a new redistricting map that eliminates much of the GOP gerrymandering of the previous map, Virginia Democrats are well-positioned to retake the majority in 2023.

Your impact in Virginia

In 2021, Blueprint donors supported 12 candidates in Virginia: 11 House of Delegates candidates and Terry McAuliffe, the Democratic gubernatorial nominee. In all, 88% of funds raised through Blueprint for these candidates went to races decided by single-digit margins, while 58.9% of funds went to races within five points or less. Donations through Blueprint always go to critical races that can make or break legislative majorities, and it's disappointing when these races don't turn out in favor of Democrats. However, the work to build a stronger democracy is a long-term, multi-cycle effort, and strategic giving to support candidates in these competitive races is integral to Democrats' ability to gain ground and build momentum year after year.

Three of Blueprint's supported Virginia candidates won re-election in 2021:



Delegate Wendy Gooditis represents HD-10 in northern Virginia. After first winning her seat in 2017, Del. Gooditis is now beginning her third term in the House of Delegates so she can continue her commitment to protecting the environment, increasing teacher pay, and providing access to quality health care for all Virginians. In addition, Del. Gooditis has previously sponsored legislation to report on state-led suicide prevention measures, combat child abuse, and limit access to guns.



Delegate Elizabeth Guzman represents HD-31 in northern Virginia. As the first Hispanic woman elected to the Virginia House of Delegates, Del. Guzman has represented her district since 2017. She has sponsored legislation to strengthen public education in the commonwealth, advocate for workers and raise the minimum wage, and ensure access to health care for all Virginians.



Delegate Rodney Willett represents HD-73 in Virginia's Greater Richmond region. Del. Willett has represented his district since 2020 and has sponsored legislation to provide affordable health care for Virginians, protect the environment, improve public education, and expand voting rights.

Supported Virginia civic organizations

Virginia's odd-year state-level elections often result in low voter turnout, even though the results of these elections can be incredibly consequential for the residents of the commonwealth. Civic organizations on the ground in Virginia lead critical, year-round work to engage and mobilize voters by demonstrating the importance of state and local elections. In 2021, Blueprint donors supported Virginia-focused organizations that strive to strengthen Virginia's civic infrastructure and increase voter turnout. Overall, these organizations received \$54,331 in funding from Blueprint donors in 2021:

New Virginia Majority mobilizes Latino, Black, Asian American Pacific Islander, and youth communities to end mass incarceration, build just economic policies, protect immigrants, and preserve the environment. In 2021, New Virginia Majority volunteers made more than 740,000 calls to voters and knocked on more than 309,000 doors across the state.

Progress Virginia builds progressive power alongside marginalized communities to tear down systems of white supremacy, advocate for equitable policies, and ensure leaders reflect the communities they serve. Leading up to the 2021 elections, Progress Virginia ran robust messaging testing to better understand the language and communications that would resonate with Virginia voters in key districts.

CASA in Action facilitates greater participation among Latinos and voters of color in elections by supporting immigrant families and ensuring that all individuals have the core support necessary for full participation in our society. In 2021, CASA in Action's voter empowerment program reached 15,465 Virginia voters in Prince William County, Fairfax County, and the Virginia Beach metro area through canvassing and digital engagement.

What this means for the midterms

Heading into the 2022 midterm elections, several trends from the 2021 Virginia elections could inform the outcome for Democrats this fall:

Trump is still a factor in GOP campaigns. Virginia Republicans' playbook made it clear that even though Trump wasn't on the ballot, Republican candidates can find electoral success by repackaging, refining, and leveraging key planks of the former president's platform to appear more moderate—even in states that voted for Biden by significant margins in 2020. This year, Democrats need to protect against vote switching from 2020 Biden voters and improve Democratic voter turnout in order to win.

Rural voter turnout was high in Virginia. The GOP successfully drove up voter turnout in Virginia's rural districts, which made the overall electorate more rural and more conservative than in 2017. That year, 47.6% of Virginia's registered voters turned out to vote, and 57% of the vote in Virginia's 20 least populous counties went to Republican gubernatorial nominee Ed Gillespie. In 2021, 54.9% of Virginia's electorate voted—the highest turnout for an odd-year election in the commonwealth in recent history—with 63% of the vote in those same 20 rural counties going to the Republican nominee, and now governor, Glenn Youngkin.

Suburbs remain competitive. Suburban voters were a key demographic in defeating Trump in 2020. The suburbs have continued to diversify and suburban voters have defected from the Republican Party, now making up an essential constituency for Democrats in nearly every swing state. While Democrats still carried suburban counties and precincts in Virginia, they did not run up the necessary margins to pull off a victory. This doesn't mean that the suburbs are guaranteed Republican wins this year, but it does mean that suburban districts across the country remain high-priority battlegrounds.

A note on high-turnout elections

An uptick in voters doesn't guarantee Democratic victory. Voter turnout increased across Virginia in 2021, with all but three localities showing an increase over 2017. However, the greatest percentage increases were in overwhelmingly Republican strongholds in suburban and rural counties. Overall, Governor Glenn Youngkin received over 500,000 more votes than GOP nominee Ed Gillespie did in 2017, while Terry McAuliffe gained fewer than 200,000 over former Governor Ralph Northam's election-winning total that year.

Fair maps and fair voting laws

Throughout 2021's decennial redistricting process, the nation saw voting rights routinely under attack. Then there was a six-month delay in the census data, which ultimately impeded states' abilities to create new maps. Though proposed maps finally started being released in September 2021, several states are still working on their proposals and a few are failing to meet their approval deadlines due to gridlock. This tighter timeline presents challenges and litigation will be a crucial tool in limiting partisan gerrymandering during and after the map-drawing process.

Fighting for a better democracy

In 2021, states passed some of the strictest voter suppression laws in history, attacking the fundamental right to vote by purging voter rolls, cutting back on early voting, and implementing voter ID laws. Blueprint donors supported organizations engaging in advocacy and litigation to combat these harmful laws and provide all voters equal and fair access to the ballot box.

All on the Line (AOTL) works to fight gerrymandering and restore fairness in redistricting through litigation and organizing communities of color. AOTL uses multi-racial, multi-issue organizing to fight against gerrymandering, and the National Redistricting Action Fund (NRAF) further supports these efforts through litigation.

In 2021, the organization identified nine priority states where legal challenges can impact fair representation over the next decade or more: Arizona, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Ohio, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Wisconsin.

Arizona Wins is a coalition of 32 labor and progressive advocacy organizations working together to build power to protect voting rights and engage and expand the Arizona electorate. Arizona Wins is implementing programs to fight against the numerous voter suppression bills that were passed last year, purging hundreds of thousands of voters from the rolls.

Democracy Docket Action Fund (DDAF) works to protect access to voting and fight for fair maps alongside national partners like the National Democratic Redistricting Action Fund and other state-based organizations. The organization has been actively filing lawsuits in election administration, in-person voting, post-election litigation, redistricting litigation, registration and vote by mail nationwide. In 2021 Democracy Docket Action Fund filed over 100 lawsuits in more than 20 states.

In Georgia, DDAF’s case with Fair Fight challenging voter intimidation practices by the right-wing organization True the Vote is moving forward as expected. The legal team has been working to investigate True the Vote’s potential voter fraud in the fact-gathering stage of the case.

In Wisconsin, the DDAF legal team went to court in January to present maps for the Wisconsin Supreme Court to adopt after the state government failed to do so. The maps put forward were applauded by many groups for best complying with the court’s redistricting criteria while also accurately representing the state. The court will announce soon which maps it plans to adopt.

With the support of Blueprint donors, DDAF was able to advance its mission to fight laws and practices that restrict the right to vote and protect the rights of all citizens to fully participate in our democratic process.

Florida Rising Together (FRT) builds independent political power that centers historically marginalized communities so everyday Floridians shape the future. FRT organized redistricting campaigns within Black and brown communities to amplify the mapping process and build public support for an equity-driven approach. The organization continued advocacy efforts at the state legislative level by demanding a transparent and fair redistricting process, and launched a public submission portal—which allows the public to post written testimonies and draw “community of interest” maps to support a fair redistricting process.

Looking ahead to the 2022 midterms

The importance of the 2022 midterm elections cannot be overstated: electing Democrats up and down the ballot is crucial to defending our democracy and protecting the integrity of future elections. This year, Blueprint is focused on protecting Democratic majorities in Congress, making inroads in key state governments, and supporting civic organizations working to register, engage, and protect voters in battleground states. Many of these races will be decided by close margins, so early and consistent funding is essential to building strong campaigns.

Protecting and expanding the Democratic majority in the U.S. Senate

Nevada: Hold

Despite a strong Democratic edge in Clark County, where most of the state's registered voters are concentrated, Nevada remains a battleground state. Democrats won the last four federal elections by slim margins—only three percentage points on average. **Sen. Catherine Cortez Masto**, Harry Reid's chosen successor, was elected to the U.S. Senate in 2016 with 47.1% of the vote and a margin of 2.4%. Support for Sen. Cortez Masto's reelection campaign began in Q4, a year ahead of the midterm elections.

Arizona: Hold

In the 2020 general election, grassroots organizers helped turn out a record number of Democratic voters to flip Arizona blue, carrying the state for President Biden by just 10,457 votes. In a special election, then-candidate **Mark Kelly** defeated Republican incumbent Sen. Martha McSally, who was appointed to fill the vacant seat of late Sen. John McCain, by a margin of just 2.4%. Sen. Kelly's seat is a must-hold for Senate Democrats to maintain the majority. Organizing early, mobilizing volunteers, and increasing voter turnout—especially among Latino voters—will be key to victory in Arizona. Early support will help his reelection campaign develop a solid strategy and establish a foundation for success in the midterms. Support for Sen. Mark Kelly's reelection campaign was recommended in Q3.

Georgia: Hold

In January, Blueprint donors supported then-candidate **Reverend Raphael Warnock** in the runoff election against incumbent Sen. Kelly Loeffler, in which Warnock defeated Loeffler by a margin of 2.0%—the second-closest margin in the U.S. Senate races that cycle. This close victory is a testament to the importance of early support for a coordinated effort that increased voter turnout among people of color and Black Georgians in particular. Sen. Warnock faces reelection this year, and his seat is a must-win for Democrats to retain the Senate majority. Support for Sen. Raphael Warnock's reelection campaign was included in Q3.

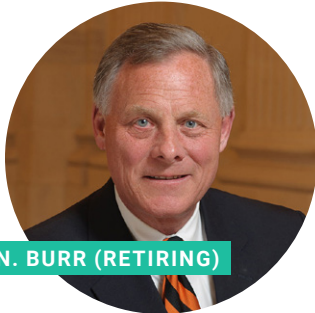


Georgia Democratic Voter Turnout

North Carolina: Flip

The retirement of incumbent Republican Sen. Richard Burr makes North Carolina a competitive U.S. Senate target in the midterms. Recent single-digit loss margins for Democrats in the state demonstrate North Carolina’s evolving political landscape and underscore the need to invest in early funding and organizing to reach more voters earlier in the election cycle. Support for the eventual Democratic nominee in North Carolina was included in Blueprint starting in Q4.

Defending the majority in the U.S. House

Early money for incumbent Democratic members of Congress running in competitive U.S. House races will be imperative to protecting the Democratic majority. The full list of nominees won’t be finalized until spring 2022 after redistricting concludes, but funds will be disbursed to incumbent candidates in **Arizona, California, Florida, Illinois, Michigan, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania,** and **Texas**, among others.

Structuring funds to work around redistricting

Our political experts determine which races are most competitive based on newly-drawn maps, coupled with the analysis offered in the Cook Political Report. Our team uses the Cook Political Report—the gold standard of national, non-partisan election analysis—as a third-party evaluation to direct the flow of individual donations through a series of state-specific congressional funds we created to help donors drive early money to competitive U.S. House races without the impediment of redistricting delays. Support for candidates in competitive U.S. House races was included in Q3 and Q4 through the Swing Left National Congressional Defense Fund, which pools money for the eventual Democratic nominees and will be distributed to specific campaigns once redistricting concludes and new maps are finalized.

Building and maintaining Democratic power in the states

Gubernatorial races

In many battleground states, Democratic governors are the last line of defense against GOP state legislatures passing radical, right-wing, and often anti-democratic legislation. In 2021, Blueprint included early money for the reelection campaign of incumbent Democratic **Governor Tony Evers in Wisconsin**, where Republicans control both chambers of the state legislature and have introduced dozens of laws aimed at making it harder to vote. Fortunately, Gov. Evers has vetoed this legislation.

In 2018, Evers narrowly beat incumbent Republican Governor Scott Walker 49.5% to 48.4%. Gov. Evers' reelection campaign will be highly competitive, and early support is key to keeping Gov. Evers in office where he serves as an important safeguard against GOP voter suppression in Wisconsin in future elections, including 2024.



Breaking up GOP majorities in state legislatures

Since 2016, Democrats have gained seven seats in the **North Carolina** State Senate, five seats in the North Carolina State House, and 12 seats in the **Texas** State House, breaking GOP supermajorities in all three chambers. Early support will help protect vulnerable Democratic incumbents and target flippable Republican seats. Support for the eventual Democratic nominees running to shift control of the North Carolina General Assembly and the Texas State House were included in Q4 through the **Swing Left North Carolina State Fund** and **Swing Left Texas State Fund**.

Engaging voters in battleground states

Your Blueprint supported several organizations who are already hard at work organizing in their communities preparing for the 2022 midterms:

Make the Road Action - Pennsylvania organizes Latino communities in the state and has extensive field operations in Berks, Bucks, Lehigh, and Philadelphia counties. On average, the Latino population across these counties has grown by 40% over the last decade and more than tripled since 2000—making Latino voters a fast-growing bloc within Pennsylvania’s electorate. The organization anticipates knocking on 597,000 doors, making 415,000 calls, sending 332,000 text messages, and holding 90,000 conversations between Q3 of 2021 and the 2022 midterms.



America Votes - Georgia supports 18 organizations leading voter education efforts while working to expand ballot access in several counties. The America Votes - Georgia coalition is educating Georgians on the redistricting process and lobbying legislators in order to prevent gerrymandered maps and ensure that state legislative districts accurately represent Georgia’s diverse communities. In Q2, The America Votes - Georgia coalition achieved 6,758,832 voter contact attempts. Tactics included door knocks, phone calls, relational contacts, and text messages. The 14 partner organizations who contributed to this total are Black Voters Matter, BlackPAC, Care in Action, Color of Change PAC, Community Change Action, Everytown for Gun Safety, Indivisible, National Redistricting Committee, New Georgia Project, Planned Parenthood, Poder LatinX, SEIU Blue, Showing Up for Racial Justice, and Sierra Club.

America Votes - North Carolina backs 14 organizations registering and educating voters, with a focus on AAPI, Black, Latino, and younger prospective voters, in urban areas and 2022 target regions. The America Votes - North Carolina coalition helped launch two voter outreach initiatives during Q3. The first was a deep canvassing program in rural districts, and the second was the creation of The New North Carolina Project, which aims to register and turn out Black and brown voters in the state’s urban and suburban areas. Additionally, the coalition—along with several partners—made over 436,000 voter contacts by phones and doors.

America Votes - Wisconsin supports 20 organizations working to expand voting opportunities—which includes launching a program to recruit pro-democracy municipal voting clerks—and enlarge the voting base. America Votes - Wisconsin is prioritizing efforts to expand ballot access and build relationships with more voters ahead of the midterms. Over the course of Q3, America Votes - Wisconsin and its partners made over 980,000 voter contact attempts. In addition to continued voter outreach, the coalition of 20 state-based organizations launched a new election administration program focused on engaging and increasing the number of pro-democracy individuals holding municipal election clerkships.

North Carolina Asian Americans Together (NCAAT) in Action is working to register, engage, and mobilize North Carolina's growing Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders (AAPI) population, a key voting bloc, ahead of North Carolina's consequential midterms.

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Thanks to contributions from Blueprint funding, NCAAT in Action was able to organize and implement North Carolina's first ever Asian American Advocacy Day at the General Assembly. This cooperative effort brought together grassroots organizations from across the state to lobby for support of the Hate Crimes Prevention Act. Additionally, we have been able to expand our important multilingual outreach, which provides accessibility to voting education materials to our community members in their own languages.”

NCAAT in Action

Progressive Leadership Alliance of Nevada (PLAN) Action Fund is a coalition of nearly 30 state-based civic engagement, immigration, Indigenous rights, and economic and environmental justice organizations. These organizations work together to expand and turn out the progressive electorate, support champions of progressive issues, and engage in work to advance policies that meaningfully improve the lives of Nevadans, especially Nevadans of color. PLAN is currently collaborating with coalition partners on voter engagement plans for 2022, which will include: door knocking, phone banking, volunteer trainings, digital and radio ads, peer-to-peer text messaging, and more.

MOVE Texas Action Fund is a grassroots organization building power in underrepresented youth communities through civic education and issue advocacy. Over 40% of Texans are under the age of 30, and 63% of them are people of color. MOVE works year-round to engage these young Texans and empower them to exercise their voice and vote on issues that matter most to them. This fall, MOVE is focused primarily on two areas of work: 1) building a culture of voting among young people by turning them out in municipal elections, and eventually the 2022 midterm election; and 2) engaging young voters in special legislative sessions to offer testimony and demonstrate against anti-voting legislation and gerrymandered maps which will disproportionately impact them.

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After a challenging year in the #txlege, we want to thank you for all you've done to further our mission.
