

# PA-08 District Primer

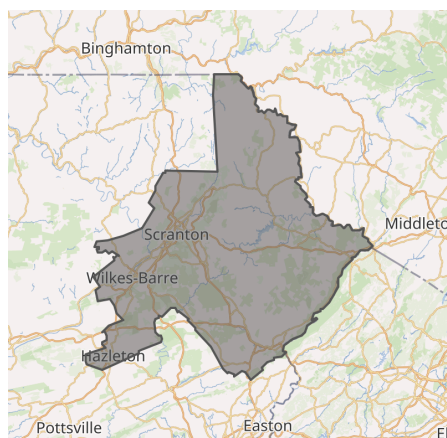

## District Facts & Stats



### Largest Cities

- Scranton, pop.: ~76,000
- Wilkes-Barre, ~45,000
- Hazelton, ~30,000

### Geography

Located in northeastern PA, the district is a mix of suburban and rural communities centered on Scranton and Wilkes-Barre. It includes all of Lackawanna, Pike, and Wayne counties, plus much of Luzerne and Monroe. The area has a history of coal and iron mining which has nearly disappeared in the 21st century.

### Citizenry

The district is slightly older, whiter, and less affluent than national averages. The district was re-drawn in 2018 to be less Democratic, with parts of Scranton and Wilkes-Barre being replaced with more conservative, rural counties of Wayne and Pike. Major employers are primarily in healthcare, manufacturing, and logistics. There are more than ten colleges and universities in the district, including the University of Scranton, Penn State Scranton, and Geisinger Medical School.

### The Local Vibe

In virtual town halls hosted by Rep. Bresnahan, benefit cuts to medicaid and social security have been the dominant issues.

An ICE detention center in Pike County houses 240 detainees. There were anti-ICE rallies in downtown Scranton in July 2026 following the shooting of Renee Good by an ICE agent in Minneapolis.

No Kings protests in October 2025 drew hundreds of people in both Scranton and Wilkes-Barre.

Despite running on an anti-corruption platform, Rep. Bresnahan is embroiled in a stock trading scandal, having allegedly used his knowledge of pending legislation to dump shares of PA companies. He is among the most active stock traders in Congress.

## Key Issues

- **Threats to benefits:** 27% of district residents rely on Medicaid, including more than half of all children. 15% rely on SNAP.
  - **Economic disruption:** Erratic tariff policy threatens manufacturing and logistics in the district.
  - **Energy costs:** The average household has two cars and each worker commutes about an hour daily. Rising energy costs will hit them hard while hurting manufacturing and logistics businesses.
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## About the Candidates

### Rob Bresnahan | Republican Incumbent

Congressman **Rob Bresnahan** is a first-term incumbent who narrowly defeated incumbent Democrat Matt Cartwright in 2024. He was born in 1990 in Wyoming PA and graduated from the University of Scranton in 2012. He took over as CEO of a third-generation family business at a young age, having joined the company as CFO while still in college. He has substantial personal wealth, estimated at approximately \$50M.

He serves on the House Committees on Agriculture as well as Transportation and Infrastructure.

Although he presents as a pro-business moderate rather than a MAGA zealot, he voted for the One Big Beautiful Bill Act which cut federal benefits in the district.

### Paige Cagnetti | Democratic Challenger

**Paige Cagnetti** is the mayor of Scranton. She was born in 1980 in Beaverton, OR, and graduated from the University of Oregon and Harvard Business School. She was elected as mayor in 2019 as an Independent running on an anti-corruption platform that was so popular it even garnered a nickname, "Paige Against the Machine." Prior to serving as mayor, she worked for the Pennsylvania Auditor General.

She's been endorsed by prominent local Democrats including Gov. Josh Shapiro, and former Rep. Matt Cartwright, and she has secured endorsements from national organizations like Emily's List, among others. She is among the first cohort of 2026 House candidates named to the DCCC's influential Red-to-Blue program. In March, she was profiled in the *New York Times*, a sign of her growing reputation as a rising star in the Democratic Party.

She is a centrist Democrat focused on anti-corruption, pro-union, pro-consumer policies, while also supporting small business and business investment in the district.

**The contrast:** While this might seem to be a contest between two popular, centrist candidates with strong local roots, the two candidates could not be more different. Despite his friendly rhetoric, Bresnahan has voted with the Republican majority most of the time, including for the OBBA, cutting key benefits for constituents, and the SAVE Act to disenfranchise voters. He also is under scrutiny for misusing his position to trade stocks for his own benefit. Cagnetti has a record of anti-corruption and supporting government funding for important priorities. Once again running on an anti-corruption platform, Cagnetti is focused on delivering for her constituents rather than using her House seat to line her pockets.
